In celebration of excellence

IT WAS, as always, as a night to celebrate excellence – a record 350 people coming together to recognise the brightest and sharpest from an industry that has battled hard in tough conditions.

But the 14th annual *Lloyd's List DCN* Australian Shipping and Transport Awards, held in Sydney last week, was as much about crediting excellence as it was about testifying to the conditions that caused such greatness to rise to the surface.

For some, the circumstances were personal.

Safe Transport Award winner Fonterra Australia has no doubts about what prompted the efforts it made which saw it recognised last week.

In an industry already notorious for truck rollovers, the liquid transporter had experienced an alarming number of such road accidents involving its staff.

Fonterra's national milk transport manager, Tony Miller, dedicated the award to the late Ian Hilder, one of the company's truck drivers, who tragically "didn't make it home one night" after such a rollover accident.

The loss prompted an overhaul of Fonterra's approach to safety which would later see the introduction of rollover stability systems and advanced driver training.

Fonterra has not had such an

incident since these measures were introduced four years ago.

For other awardees, their recognition was as much about them as those who had helped them in their professional endeavours.

New Generation Award winner Nick Probert, among five finalists recognised in the category, said he could not have achieved without the support of his colleagues over the years.

The 32-year-old, now with Strang LPP, said he would not have stayed in the shipping and transport industry without the mentoring from those with and for whom he had worked.

Mr Probert, and runner-up Todd Emmert, looked forward to helping the next generation to find success in the industry.

For some category winners it was a case of going one better than previous years.

Captain Cliff Beazley could not hide his joy when Port Ash Australian Ship-Handling Centre, based north of Newcastle, claimed the **Training and Education Award**.

After being named as a finalist in the category last year, Port Ash was given substantial support from pilots and port authorities who use the advanced shiphandling centre to train.

The centre also received overwhelming endorsement from the Royal Australian Navy, which has seen a 95% reduction in berthing incidents since it began sending its personnel to Port Ash.

Similarly, ro/ro specialist Wallenius Wilhelmsen Logistics had long been known for its pursuit of new benchmarks in environmental responsibility.

After past recognition as a finalist, WWL claimed this year's **Green Transport Award** for its leadership across a number of areas related to the environment.

Other shipping lines recognised were Hanjin, K Line and Regional Container Line, who were awarded the **Liner Trade to Asia Award** for their ASA consortium.

The PAN/NASP/AUS-1 service – run by CMA CGM, Marfret and ANL – took out the **Rest of the World category**.

Considerable support from customers and port users saw

Sydney Ports Corporation claim the **Innovation in Security Award** for systems such as its Passage Point innovations.

The port's security manager, Steve Limebeer, was recognised for leading the introduction of measures which boosted security and cut red-tape.

It follows Sydney Ports's success in the Maritime Security category in 2006.

Later, former Sydney Ports chairman David Field reiterated the need for the shipping industry to renew its support for the many branches of the Mission to Seafarers around Australia.

The Field & Associates managing director said he remained concerned that there had been a significant reduction in financial and "in kind" support.

The awards evening had earlier recognised the Sydney Bethel Union for almost 190 years of support for the mission.

The union accepted the inaugural **Seafarers Welfare Award**.

Bulk minerals equipment specialist Mobile Conveying Services took out the **Transport and Logistics Intermodal Award**, while Magellan Logistics was named the 2009 **Freight Forwarder of the Year**.

OMC International was recognised with the **Maritime Services Award** for its work in developing under keel clearance systems, which it has taken to international markets.
